## Tanya Visser's Amber Valley

August Meeting of the Garden Club had a special guest -Tanya Visser: Editor of the Gardener magazine and the recent recipient of the Gold Medal from the South African Nurserymens Association in recognition of her contribution to the industry.

Tanya's past presentations have been so well received that this meeting had an audience of 280. They entered past the beautiful arrangement done by Marilyn and Wendy and vases of colourful poppies on the tables and took their seats, watching her organizing the plants brought in for the talk and ready to be entertained with facts and fun. She started by saying "See the Beauty" of plants.

The theme of her presentation was Container Gardening and she covered topics of container choice, growing media preparation and plant choice.

The choice of container is endless but the one must is drainage.

Cover the drainage hole. A piece of shade cloth is a good option. If it's a big pot put in a plastic bottle to decrease the amount of growing media needed and reduce the weight.

Wide top is best, here she reminisced about the Alibaba pot so popular years ago. The bulbous body and narrow neck which made it impossible to remove an old root bound plant.

Growing media for container plants must supply all the required nutrients.

½ bucket compost, ½ bucket potting soil, ½ bucket Palm peat (which increases in size when soaked in water). Slow release fertilizer and a water retention product such as

Hydrocache which can be added to the mix as granules or a polymer slurry put into the planting hole.

She demonstrated how the granules swell when water is added and forms a thick slurry.







Her hint for checking the quality of bag of potting mix is to hold up the bag for 1 minute and if it feels light, it's not suitable.

She also had a test for soil in an existing pot that needs refreshing. Remove a handful and squeeze it. It should keep its shape which indicates it is good and alive with organic material and has sufficient structure for good growth.

If it is dry and powdery and easily brushed off it needs replacing. Remove about 6 inches and replace with a good potting medium mix.

Pots of seasonal plantings such as bulbs can be used to beautify the area other larger pots

Choice of plants is endless and the guideline to follow is the combination of Colour, Texture, Form. Also remember "who is in charge" and don't try to grow a plant that will not flourish in our weather conditions.

Tanya suggested going to the nursery and trying out some combinations bearing in mind her selection options.

Thriller – a tall dramatic plant Filler – a leafy medium sized plant Spiller – cascading plant that can soften the edge of the container.

Hanging baskets were also discussed and here she had some amusing comments on how hanging baskets are often hung so high that what can be seen is just the bottom of the basket. Eye level is the best height so that the plants can be seen and appreciated.

Frequent watering is needed for baskets and a foliar spray is also beneficial.

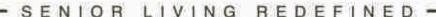
Petunias are suitable for baskets as they are self-cleaning and do not need dead heading.

Plant suggestions for containers were Flax, Osteospermum, Alyssum, Fuchsias, Lavender and Alstroemeria and there are many more suitable plants.

She demonstrated how to pull a flower off the Alstroemeria plant by holding the stem at the base and pulling it off and not cutting it.

She took a quick rest on the steps of the stage while she was thanked and given a gift for her most enjoyable

After the talk tea and refreshments were enjoyed by all. There were free back copies of her magazines and gardening goodies and some plants for sale.

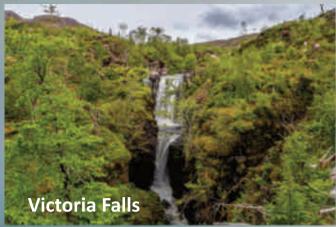




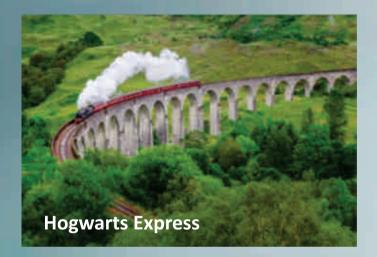




## IN SEARCH OF







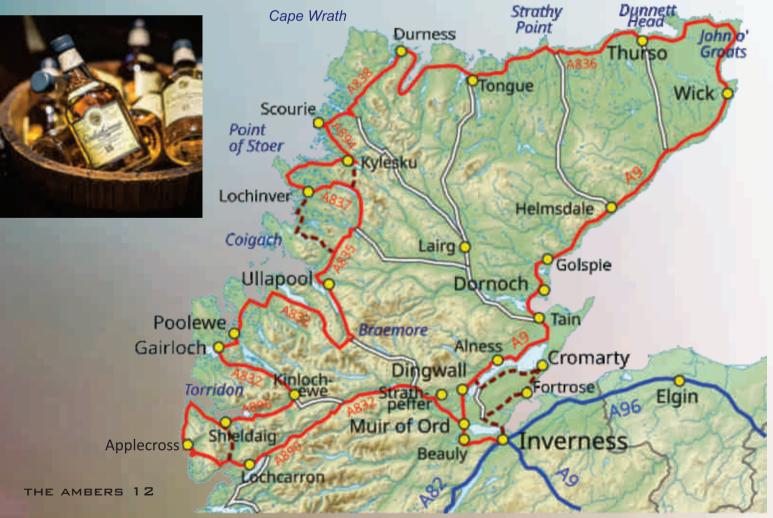
On 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2024, my family and I set off from Ashbourne, Derbyshire, to travel the NC500 (North Coast 500 Miles) around the northern top of Scotland on a warm and sunny

We travelled via Edinburgh, where we spent one night, and on to Inverness the next day which is where the NC500

The purpose of our journey was a 10 day holiday travelling one of Britain's most beautiful roads with two sea trips and one on Loch Ness in the hope of finding Puffins along the

Whist in Inverness, we visited the Dalwhinnie Whiskey Distillery and enjoyed a few drams of delicious whiskey! We also took a trip on Loch Ness and saw a variety of sea-birds including Kittiwakes, Fulmars and Seagulls but alas no Puffins and no Loch Ness monster either!

Our next stop was the beautiful town of Wick with three harbours. After a quick visit to the Old Poultney Distillery we set off on a three hour long sea journey along the coast to explore magnificent sea caves whilst looking for Killer Whales which, like the Puffin seem to have disappeared!

On the way to Fort William we made a detour in order to travel along the single track (steep and winding) pass to Applecross previously used by farmers to move their cattle to market – certainly not a trip for the feint hearted! Jeremy Clarkson used the pass for a 'Top Gear' show. The café at the end of the pass with its beautiful walled garden was a welcome relief and nice break!

In Tongue we spent two nights in delightful accommodation before moving on to Althacelgach for a night in a motel on the shores of the loch. On the next day we travelled to Gairloch where we visited the Arctic Convoy Museum which was of special interest because my father-in-law was a sailor in the Royal Navy escorting Merchant Navy vessels to Archangel and Murmansk during the Second World War. He was on the HMS Searcher, a small carrier on loan from the US Navy, previously known as the USS Chesire. Whilst on route to Gairloch we visited the Inverewa Gardens. Scotland's equivalent to our Kirstenbosch Gardens, with plants from all over the world including South Africa.

We also embarked on another boat ride on Loch Ewe and saw how lobster pots are used. There were six crabs in one of the pots but no lobsters. We saw grey seals and sea birds but no Puffins.

Whist in Gairloch we visited the 'Victoria Falls,' named after Queen Victoria who often visited Scotland....It was a patch on the falls in Zimbabwe!!

On our way to Fort William, our last overnight stop on this journey, we visited the viaduct which was used during the making of the Harry Potter films, to see the 'Hogwarts Express,' (a Jacobite Steam Train) travelling from Fort William to Ma'laig. Literally hundreds of people flocked to see and photograph the train which stopped on the Glenfinnan Viaduct for this purpose.

On the next day we travelled along the banks of Loch Lomond to Oban, a beautiful town with a large harbour and superb distillery where I was given a bottle of single malt whisky to celebrate my birthday!

This concluded our trip which ended with three day visit to one of our old friends from Botswana who now live in Kirkcudbright in the Dumfries and Galloway district, the home of my wife's family.

World Alzheimer's Day was celebrated on 21 September. As a result, each year, in September, the Association for Dementia and Alzheimer's of South Africa (ADASA), KZN region, hosts a main event in a different part of the Province.

A large and diverse audience of 135 plus people, including professional staff from numerous care facilities, filled the lounge. Besides high quality eats catered by Barnaby of Amberglen's Capitol Caterers, the programme featured three Howick-based experts in the field.



The first speaker was general practitioner, Dr RP Jonck, who spoke on "Identifying early cognitive impairment and protecting brain health." The second speaker was Dr Penelope Alison, a speech therapist and wellness advocate, who spoke on "A virtue-based approach to Alzheimer's care." And the third speaker was Music Therapist, Christopher Wildman, who spoke on "the role of music in enhancing quality of life for people living with dementia."

The ADASA KZN Regional Manager, Kim Hellberg, introduced the programme with an overview. Currently, over 55 million people around the world are living with dementia. She stressed the importance, with rising global rates, of working towards a better future for those living

with dementia, where neither stigma nor ignorance prevent people from seeking support, advice, a timely diagnosis, treatment and care. But also, that communities and service providers are sensitized to the condition and are able to provide the extra consideration and assistance required.

Dr Jonck gave a very informative talk that stressed the importance of early detection and treatment of dementia. This is because it can be arrested and a number of potential problems that arise can be anticipated and addressed.

Dr Jonck spoke about the importance of both the medical treatment options and the nonmedical management of dementia. He gave important guidance on ways we can minimise or prevent the onset of dementia by following the correct (Mediterranean) diet and lifestyle and avoiding, or treating conditions such as high sugar levels, smoking, high blood pressure and cholesterol, which hasten the onset of the most common type of dementia, which is vascular dementia. Alzheimers is the second most common type. There are also a number of less common types of dementia.

Depression and hearing loss are also two important

factors that must be addressed as preventative measures. Other preventative measures include keeping the mind active (cognitive training), physical exercise and staying socially connected. Music and dancing, and pet ownership, are also prescribed. Finally, we need to maintain good gut health and good sleep hygiene.

Dr Penelope Allison, who is no longer practicing as a speech therapist, but calls herself an 'Ambassador for Carers', spoke on the importance of our social emotional wellbeing as a preventative daily health practice that can greatly improve our overall health. She provided a number of practical ways this can be tackled through breathing, pausing, living in the present, practicing inner silence and thought management.

Last, but not least, was Speech Therapist, Christopher Wildman, who enchanted us by making us sing and sway to our music. He demonstrated how personal eye and body contact and the use of sounds and songs can often get through to those who feel unseen (living in a bubble). One needs to use intuition, courage and

experimentation to find what is meaningful for each individual.

The presentation ended with this heartrending, simple verse:

My eyes do see, My ears do hear I am still me, So let's be clear My memory may fade, My walk may slow, I am ME inside Don't let me go.



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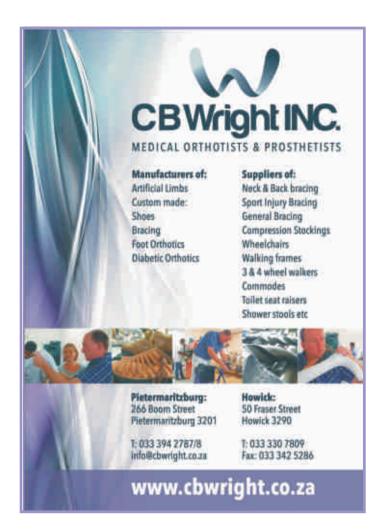
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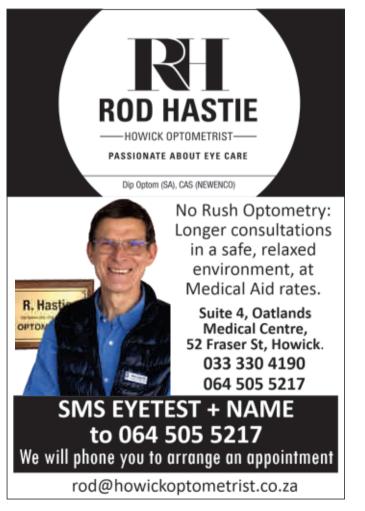

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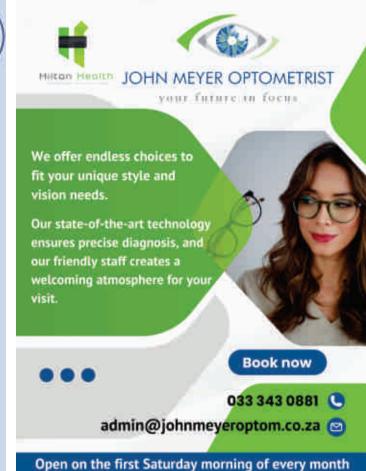
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# Nuisance Law: Keeping the Holiday Season Merry and Neighbour-Friendly

As the holiday season nears and we unwrap the lights, stack the wood for the braai, and cue the festive tunes, there's one thing many of us forget—our neighbours' peace and quiet. South African property law, especially nuisance law, steps in as a cheerful reminder that our property rights come with a side of responsibility.

In legal terms, a "nuisance" is an unreasonable interference with a person's enjoyment of their property. Think loud noise, excessive pollution, or even wandering tree roots. For a nuisance to be actionable, however, the inconvenience must be "material"—something more than trivial, disturbing the comfort of ordinary living.

South African courts apply a "reasonableness test" when determining if an interference truly qualifies as a nuisance. They assess factors like your neighbourhood's character, the severity of the disturbance, your neighbour's tolerance and even the sensitivity of the complainant. A few factors weigh in, including locality (lively neighbourhood vs. quiet suburb), proportionality, and practicality of reducing the nuisance. Think of it as a balance: Your right to a peaceful property versus a neighbour's right to ordinary use. For instance, city dwellers should tolerate a certain amount of noise, while homeowners next to a golf course might expect the odd golf ball landing nearby.

So, how can you keep your holiday celebrations legal and neighbour-friendly?

- 1. Keep the volume holiday-friendly: We all love All I Want for Christmas—but maybe not on repeat at full volume. Nuisance law hinges on what's reasonable, so maybe keep the carolling indoors and let your speakers stay at "neighbour-friendly" levels.
- 2. Mind your smoke: Braai season is our favourite season, but excessive smoke is one of the quickest ways to step into nuisance territory. Be mindful of when and where your braai is set up, maybe skip the extra charcoal if the wind's blowing toward your neighbour's window.
- 3. Let there be light (within reason): Festive lights bring holiday cheer, but overly bright or flashing displays might feel less *Home Alone* and more *Nightmare before Christmas* to neighbours. Choose decor that sparkles without sending SOS signals across the street.

If all else fails, the law offers remedies. An interdict can halt the nuisance, but it is only granted if no other solution exists. Alternatively, if your property has suffered damage, you might claim compensation.

Ultimately, nuisance cases often hinge on balancing rights, reasonableness, and tolerance. So, if your neighbour's holiday lights rival the sun, consider talking things out before heading to court. After all, litigation is a costly last resort.

The bottom line? A little cheer with a sprinkle of neighbourly courtesy goes a long way!

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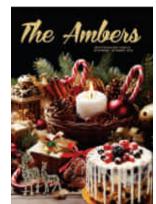

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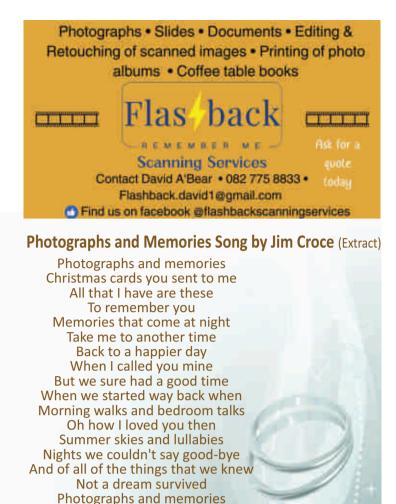
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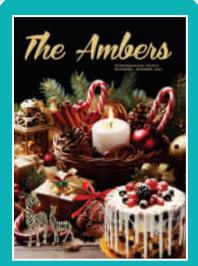

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### **Spiced Apple and Fruit Mince Crumble Slice**

Try this delicious spiced apple & fruit mince crumble slice, perfect for morning or afternoon tea especially during the Festive Season. Serves 10 generous servings

### **Ingredients**

100g butter, softened

1/3 cup caster sugar

1 egg yolk

11/4 cup plain flour

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 cup semolina

1 tbsp milk

60g slivered almonds

375g packet mixed fruit

1/2 cup plum

1 large apple, peeled, coarsely grated

1/2 cup (firmly packed) brown sugar

1/4 cup orange juice

2 tbsp brandy, rum or orange juice

2 tsp mixed spice

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp cinnamon

### Method

To make filling, simmer ingredients in medium saucepan over med-low heat for 4-5 minutes, stirring, until syrupy. Transfer to tray to cool.

Preheat oven to 180C (160C fanforced). Grease and line 28cm x 18cm slice tin with baking paper. To make pastry, beat butter and sugar with electric mixer until creamy. Beat in egg yolk. Fold in flour, baking powder, semolina and milk and bring mixture together with hands. Press threequarters of pastry evenly into tin. Spread over fruit mixture. Add almonds to remaining crumble mixture and lightly press over filling. Bake for 25-30 minutes, until pale golden. Cool in pan. Trim edges and cut into 4 lines, then each line into 4-5 squares. Refrigerate in warm weather.

### Notes

Recipe works just as well for traditional round pies, either way delicious served as desert with custard or ice cream.



### Origins of Mince Pies

Mince pies are a favourite during the Festive Season, though it's unlikely its original form would appeal today!

During the Tudor period they were rectangular, shaped like a manger and often had a pastry baby Jesus on the lid. They were made from 13 ingredients to represent Jesus and his disciples and were all symbolic to the Christmas story.

As well as dried fruit such as raisins, prunes and figs, they included lamb or mutton to represent the shepherds and spices (cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg) for the Wise Men. It was only later, post Reformation, that the mince pie adopted a round shape.

to pace, pant, cling to their owners, hide in the cupboard, or panic. In severe cases, they'll claw through doors, chew carpets, or break through windows in their escalating fear.

### The following 5 tips can help your dog cope with storm anxiety:

- 1. Give your pet a safe space. Provide a comfortable and safe indoor space to create the feeling of a haven. Make sure your pet doesn't feel trapped. Be sure to fill it with familiar items such as your pet's bed, favourite toys and
- 2. If there are windows in the room, close the blinds or curtains or cover the windows so your pet can't see
- 3. Distract your pet. If your pet is afraid of thunder, play calming music to drown out the thunder claps. You can also keep your dog distracted with treats and favourite toys and playing or cuddling with them.
- 4. There are a wide variety of products that may help your pet with storm anxiety/phobia from storm jackets/wraps, calming liquids, calming bandanas and collars to over the counter medications. The trick is to either keep your pet at a calming therapeutic level during the storm season or dose the medication before the storms. In severe cases, with pets that are extremely fearful of thunderstorms, we can prescribe anti-anxiety medication that will calm them in known times of stress.

ven before the first clap of thunder, pets can begin 5. Most importantly, practice positive reinforcement with your pet. Do not scold or punish them for displays of storm anxiety, but remember that their behaviour is not about disobedience, but about high levels of fear. Do anything you can to help your pet feel better—teaching them new, pleasant associations is the best way to help anxious

> Lastly, ensure that your pet wears identification and is microchipped. In the unfortunate event that your pet should run away, it may run blindly away without knowing where it is going. When it eventually calms down it will probably not know where it is or how to return. A microchip gives you the greatest chance that you and your pet will be reunited!

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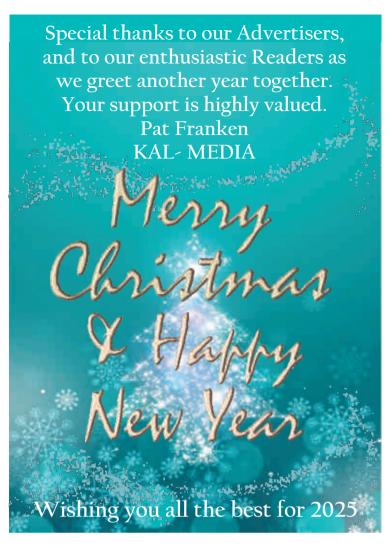


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
