What Next?

Through Robin's technical and creative expertise, and Elwyn's creative script writing, we were entertained by wonderful visuals and clever editing, which included seeing the late great Nat King Cole join a duet with his daughter Natalie and Andrea Bocelli (which involved Robin having to change the key that Nat was singing in to match his daughter!)

The Ambers Drama Group players - Mike Spain (compere and reader), Tracy Laubscher, William Urquhart, Joanmary Urquhart, Anthony Smith, Chris King, and Ralph Anley - gave an eloquent and often humourous commentary of the various performances. Of special mention was Elwyn Jenkins' poignant "A Child's Christmas in Wales", which Thomas recorded at the BBC as a 45 rpm record in 1952.

We also had comedy songs about Grandma being run over by a Reindeer, and a very informative piece about the composing and performing of Leroy Anderson's, Sleigh Ride (1950), which took him two years to complete.

Robin had again found intriguing video clips showing various sections of school bands separately playing each of the many instrumental facets of this complicated and beautiful song. These he edited together to form a complete song.

Remembering WW1 was "Christmas in the Trenches : 1915" written by Cormac MacConnell and sung by Irish group Celtic Thunder, followed by Christmas 1914 written and sung by English woman Catherine Rushton. The tale of the Christmas truce in 1914 was the theme of this segment.

"I saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus" was sung by a very young Michael Jackson and his sibling brothers who were known as The Jackson 5.

"My Dear Boy" was a short poem read by Ralph Anley who played the teenage kid on the bicycle "Just Ralph" from Down Under who's not "the kind of boy whose company (his grandmother) would enjoy"! This was a reminder how grandparents' little angels grow up on the other side of the world with their cute little photos on their social media profiles.

There were many other seasonal gems from way back when right up to last year, which had the large audiences at both performances enraptured throughout a very enjoyable show.

Our Marmalade Maker

Our Amberglen Wednesday market is not going to be the same in 2025. In the past, buyers have been greeted with an array of jewel-coloured marmalades and jams, all made and sold by Gordon Flower. After 12 years of doing this, he has decided to call it a day. What prompted him to start was seeing citrus trees all round Amberglen, with fruit unpicked, or lying wasted on the ground. His mother was always making jams and preserves so he'd watched her as he was growing up. But he also used his recipe books. He made marmalades from the varieties of citrus available, but also experimented with other additions. His whiskey marmalade was particularly popular. He also made all kinds of jams with whatever fruits were in season.

In May 2024 he received a certificate for winning Bronze at an International Marmalade Festival in England.

One is amazed at the time and effort Gordon must have put in to preparing and cooking this fruit – often I imagine in a hot kitchen – as well as the time he spent cheerfully selling at our markets. So I am sure we wish him all the best in his retirement from this retirement hobby.





n early December Amberglen were once again treated to an entertaining musical event, this time by the accomplished Pietermaritzburg Caledonian Pipe Band. The group of pipers and drummers marched into the Lounge neatly attired in red kilts. A rousing, polished performance featuring many well-known tunes followed. The star of the show was young Oliver, who played a solo while the other members took a break to restore their breathing. After the audience had shown their appreciation and an encore of Flower of Scotland, the Band proceeded to the Care Centre to entertain the residents and carers. We thank those who attended the performance and made generous donations towards supporting this group of skilled performers. After watching the show and to satisfy my curiosity, I researched into the origins and mechanics of playing the bagpipes was necessary:

'Bagpipes are a woodwind instrument using enclosed reeds fed from a constant reservoir of air in the form of a bag. The Great Highland bagpipes are well known, but people have played bagpipes for centuries throughout large parts of Europe, Northern Africa, Western Asia, around the Persian Gulf and northern parts of South Asia. The most common method of supplying air to the bag is through blowing into a blowpipe or blowstick. In some pipes the player must cover the tip of the blowpipe with the tongue while inhaling, to prevent unwanted deflation of the bag, but most blowpipes have a non-return valve that eliminates this need. Materials used for bags vary widely, but the most common are the skins of local animals such as goats, dogs, sheep, and cows. More recently, bags made of synthetic materials including Gore-Tex have become much more common. The chanter is the melody pipe, played with two hands. All bagpipes have at least one chanter; some pipes have two chanters, The chanter is usually openended, so there is no easy way for the player to stop the pipe from sounding. Thus most bagpipes share a constant legato sound with no rests in the music. Most bagpipes have at least one drone, a pipe that generally is not fingered but rather produces a constant harmonizing note throughout play (usually the tonic note of the chanter). My admiration for these skilled performers has dramatically increased!

Incidentally, at Midnight on New Year's Eve, Doug Hathorn, one of the Pipers, following a long-standing tradition, arrived at Amberglen to pipe in the New Year to his mother, Mairi, in Gordon Lane.





t Christopher Duigan's Piano Concert in the Amber Ridge Auditorium each month many people usually seat themselves so they have a good view of his hands while he plays. At his concert in November everybody in the Auditorium had the best seat in the house because an overhead view of his hands playing was projected onto the big screen.

I had often thought it would be nice to show Chris's hands on the screen, but the Auditorium does not have a camera to do this. He mentioned to me that he uses his cell phone camera as one of the camera views in the YouTube streaming concerts he produced from his home, so he offered to bring an adaptor cable with him to try out in the Auditorium. 

AMBERS STAMP CLUB SIR ROWLAND HILL - The Father of the Postage System **By Dick Schuurman**



Uniform Penny Post. In the 1830s the postal system was mismanaged, wasteful, expensive and slow. Letters were normally paid for by the recipient, not the sender. The recipient could simply refuse delivery. For the working class, a letter could cost more than a day's wage. In addition, postal rates were complex, depending on the distance and the number of sheets in a letter. Rowland Hill was born in Kidderminster,

Worcestershire on 3 December 1795 into a family of enlightened educators during an age notorious for public school brutality as shown in the books of Charles Dickens. The family ethos was to instill moral training by kindness instead of fear of authority. At the age of 12, Rowland became a student teacher in his father's school. He taught astronomy and earned extra money fixing scientific instruments. He also worked at the Assay Office in Birmingham and painted landscapes in his spare time. On 27 September 1827, Hill married Caroline Pearson, from nearby Wolverhampton; he became frustrated in his role as a schoolmaster and started looking for other avenues to achieve social progress and personal advancement. He worked on all sorts of ideas, inventions and innovations. Hill served from 1833 until 1839 as secretary of the South Australian Colonisation Commission, which worked successfully to establish a settlement, without convicts, in what is now Adelaide.

Postal Reform. Rowland Hill first started to take a serious interest in postal reforms in 1835. In 1836 Robert Wallace, MP, provided Hill with numerous books and documents, which Hill described as a "half hundred weight of material". Hill commenced a detailed study of these documents and this led him to publish, in early 1837, a pamphlet called Post Office Reform its Importance and Practicability. He submitted a copy of this to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Thomas Spring Rice, on 4 January 1837, but was not released to the general public. The Chancellor suggested improvements, asked for considerations and requested a supplement, which Hill duly produced and supplied on 28 January 1837. There was considerable parliamentary opposition, but merchants, bankers and traders formed the "Mercantile Committee" to advocate Hill's plan and push for its adoption. In 1839 Hill was given a two-year contract to run the new system. And so the "Penny Post" was born: a letter not weighing more than ½ ounce (14 grams) could be sent to any destination in the UK for one penny, regardless of distance. Together with Henry Cole, Hill announced a competition to design the stamps. Out of some 2600 entries, none was considered suitable however, so a rough design endorsed by Hill was chosen instead, featuring an easily recognisable profile of Queen Victoria. Hill believed this would be difficult to forge. The colour for

Early Life. Sir Rowland Hill is best the stamp was to be black: the famous "Penny Black". The known as the originator of the world's first postage stamp was a simple idea, but revolutionary. ".....A bit of paper just large enough to bear the stamp, and covered at the back with a glutinous wash". First issued on 1 May 1840 it was soon followed by a two pence blue stamp on 8 May covering the double letter rate. As a canceller was chosen the Maltese Cross, applied with red ink. The Penny Black lasted less than a year. A red Maltese Cross was difficult to see on the black design and the red ink was easy to remove; both made it possible to reuse cancelled stamps. In February 1841 the Treasury switched to the Penny Red and began using black ink for cancellations instead, which was more effective and difficult to remove.



L. to R: Penny Black with red Maltese Cross and letters in bottom corners only; two pence blue, letters in bottom corners only; Penny Red with black Maltese Cross with letters in bottom corners only and Penny Red with letters in all four corners. However, people still re-used stamps by combining the un-cancelled parts of two stamps to form an unused whole so in 1858, as a further safeguard the topcorner symbols on the Penny Red were replaced by the lower corner check letters in reverse. In 1839, the year before the Penny Black was issued, the British postal service moved 82 million pieces of mail, many of these with no revenue to show for. In 1840, the first year of the issue, the Penny Black more than doubled the mail volume to over 169 million pieces. It had brought mail within reach of the ordinary person, something that pleased Hill immensely. Soon other countries would follow with their own issues.



1940 saw the centenary of the first adhesive postage stamp. May 1940 was during the dark days of war, yet the British post office managed to issue a commemorative set of six stamps featuring Queen Victoria and King George VI. See left.

Portugal, which was neutral during the war, also issued a set of stamps to commemorate this centenary and which portraved Sir Rowland Hill. See right.



By 1979 the world had recovered from World War II and, in August of that year, many countries celebrated the centenary of the death of Sir Rowland Hill with the issue of a set of commemorative stamps often accompanied by a miniature sheet. Here are a few of the more attractive stamps and a miniature sheet. The background of the miniature sheet, (see below), replicates Mulready envelopes which were issued for use about the time of the first Penny Postage stamps.





In May 1990 it was 150 years since the Penny Black made its entry and this was commemorated by postal authorities in several countries. Some countries commemorated this by issuing special stamps or other philatelic items. We now await the next milestone year of 2029: the 150th anniversary of the death of Sir Rowland Hill and, further along the timeline, the year of 2040: the bicentenary of the first adhesive stamp.

Legacy and Commemorations.

Hill has two legacies. The first was his model for the education of the emerging middle classes. The second was his model for an efficient postal system to serve businesses and the general public, including the postage stamp and the system of low and uniform postal rates, which is often taken for granted in the modern



world. In this, he not only changed postal services around the world, but also made commerce more efficient and profitable, even though it took 30 years before the British Post Office's recovered to its 1839 level. The Uniform Penny Post continued in the UK into the 20th century and, at one point, one penny (1d) paid for up to four ounces (113g). In 1860 his services were rewarded with the honour of knighthood and in 1864 the University of Oxford conferred on him the degree of D.C.L.; on 6th of June 1879, shortly before his death, he was presented with the freedom of the City of London. There are four public statues of Hill. The earliest is in Birmingham and now in the foyer of the Royal Mail sorting office in Newtown, Birmingham. A marble statue in Kidderminster, Hill's birthplace, was unveiled in 1881 at the junction of Vicar and Exchange Streets. Hill is prominent in Kidderminster's history. There is a large shopping mall linking Vicar Street and Worcester Street named The Rowland Hill Shopping Centre. Until 2019 there was a pub called The Penny Black in the town centre. In London a bronze statue (see left), made in 1881, stands outside the King Edward Building (formerly London's principal Post Office) in King Edward Street. There is a large sculpture in Dalton Square, Lancaster, The Victoria Monument, depicting eminent Victorians and Rowland Hill is Included. There are at least two marble busts of Hill, also unveiled in 1881. One is in St Paul's Chapel, Westminster Abbey; another is in Albert Square, Manchester. In recognition of his contributions to the development of the modern postal system, Rowland Hill is commemorated at the Universal Postal Union, the UN agency charged with regulating the international postal system His name appears on one of the two large meeting halls at the UPU headquarters in Bern, Switzerland. In Adelaide, the capital of South Australia, both Hill Street, North Adelaide, and Rowland Place in the city centre are named in his honour. The Rowland Hill Awards, started by the Royal Mail and the British Philatelic Trust in 1997, are annual awards for philatelic "innovation, initiative and enterprise". In 1882 the Post Office instituted the Rowland Hill Fund for postal workers, pensioners and dependents in need. The Rowland Hill Memorial Fund of Ireland was founded for Ireland in 1928, to help serving or retired staff and their dependents; it assists more than 300 people annually.





WHEN PRAGMATISM COUNTS APPOINTING EXECUTOR OF YOUR ESTATE

WHAT IS AN EXECUTOR OF A DECEASED ESTATE?

Whilst we are alive, we gather assets, create liabilities, open investment and bank accounts, and do what we can to build and manage our estates. It is advisable that we draw up a Last Will and Testament to specify what we would like to happen to our estate after we pass away. When we pass away, someone has to assist in administering and winding up our estate, and give effect to the wishes we express in our wills. This is the duty of an Executor.

HOW DO I SPECIFY MY EXECUTOR?

Your Last Will and Testament should have a nomination clause specifying who you would like your Executor to be. The Master may grant Letters of Executorship in this instance in terms of section 15(1) of the Administration of Estates Act. If you pass away intestate (without a valid will), it will be up to your intestate heirs to nominate an Executor. If the heirs cannot agree upon the choice of an executor, the Master may ultimately be called upon to nominate an Executor in terms of section 18 of the Administration of Estates Act. However, the Master only involves themselves in such a manner as a last resort, and it can significantly delay the administration of the estate as the estate administration can only commence once an executor has been appointed.

HOW MANY EXECUTOR'S AM I ALLOWED TO NOMINATE?

You may nominate as many Executors as you would like in your will. An Executor will also be required to sign multiple documents throughout the administration process. The more Executors you appoint in terms of your will, the more difficult it becomes to administer the estate. In some instances where more than one Executor is appointed, the Executors may choose to grant one Executor their special power of attorney thereby authorising that person to attend to the day to day administration of the estate. Having multiple Executors can also become an issue when decisions need to be made with regards to the Estate, as disagreements may arise and this can delay the administration process.

WHO SHOULD I CHOOSE AS MY EXECUTOR?

This can significantly delay the administration of the estate as the original held by the institution is sent by them to the Master and this process, together with the fact that the family are now required to nominate an alternative executor to the executor named in the will of their deceased family member, can cause delays in an alternative executor being appointed. It would therefore be wise to check what monetary threshold the institution has, if any, if you have chosen an institution to be your Executor. If you do not fall within their threshold, you may wish to consider changing your Executor, as the institution will likely renounce Executorship once you pass away.

EXECUTORS AND THE MASTERS OFFICE

Please also take note that your estate will be reported at the Master's office responsible for the area in which you pass away. It can be quite inconvenient if your Executor lives in Johannesburg, for example, and your estate is reported in Pietermaritzburg. This is because the Executor's original signature will be required on multiple documents, and the Master has multiple documents which it requires to be submitted throughout the administration process. In addition, it is helpful for the Executor to be close to the Master's office to enable the Executor to follow matters up in person (either personally or by way of a Master's office clerk who attends upon the Master on behalf of the Executor). It is best to submit documents to the Master's office by hand, as the postal service is dysfunctional, documents would have to be couriered which will incur courier charges. Your Executor will likely have to appoint and pay for an agent to deal with the Estate if they do not live near the area in which you pass away. An alternative to this is that your Executor may ask the Master of the High Court in the area in which you passed away to renounce jurisdiction and grant jurisdiction to the Master's office in the area in which they reside or practice. The Executor will have to provide the Master with reasons as to why they would like the Master's office to renounce jurisdiction, and the Master then has the discretion as to whether to renounce jurisdiction or not.





Method

Preheat oven to 220°C. Grease two 300ml souffle dishes with butter, then sprinkle with extra sugar to coat. Refrigerate for 15 minutes to chill. Place the chocolate and cream in a pan over low heat, stirring until smooth. Remove from the heat. Stir in the egg volks and brandy, then cover and set aside for up to 2 hours.

Whisk the 3 egg whites until stiff peaks form, then add caster sugar and whisk until glossy. If the chocolate has gone cold, reheat slightly then fold in 1 tablespoon of the egg white into mixture, then fold in the rest. Fill the dishes to just below the rim, bake for 8-10 minutes until risen. Dust with icing sugar and serve immediately.

Ingredients

Method

Preheat the oven to 220C. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

For the apple and mustard salad, core the apple and thinly slice. Cut the slices into matchsticks and combine in a bowl with the lemon juice. Top with the salad, cucumber and chopped parsley, then cover and refrigerate until required.

Combine the honey, mustard powder, ginger and coriander in a small bowl with 2 teaspoons sea salt. Place the pork fillet on prepared tray, spread mixture over top of the pork and roast for 16-18 minutes or until browned all over. Remove from the oven. cover loosely with foil and rest for 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, add the wholegrain mustard and mayonnaise to the salad and toss until well combined, season to taste with sea salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Divide the salad between serving plates and top with slices of pork.





